A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

The following is the 2008 annual report on the activities reported and acted upon by the officers and staff of your Police Department.

The yearly report documents what is taking place in our community. Our Village continues to be an active community. The Maxwell Street Days weekends in the summer months, the Mukwonago Lions Club Summerfeste in June, the four annual parades, and the Chamber of Commerce Fallfest and Midnight Magic events were all successful, despite the extra rain and snow we endured. The storms that brought heavy rains and flooding in early June gave all Village Departments challenges we had not faced before. During our state of emergency with the concerns about the possible failure of the Phantom Lake Dam, we learned a lot of things. We saw area businesses, such as Berg Construction, come forward to assist with manpower and equipment. We received help and assistance from the Department of Natural Resources, the Phantom Lakes Management Lake District, Town of Mukwonago Police Department, Wisconsin State Patrol, Town of East Troy Police Department, Waukesha County Emergency Government and many other agencies not mentioned. Governor Doyle stopped by to lend support and view our concerns about the possible dam failure and its impact on our community. We worked with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) during the aftermath, filling out the necessary reports and forms. I saw and experienced first hand cooperation between agencies. I saw neighbors helping neighbors fill sandbags to help redirect flood waters. This event just reaffirmed to me what a great community this is to live and work in. I feel a great measure of strength is not found in how we handle events when everything is sunny and smooth, rather it is found in how we handle the difficult challenges and crisis. That is when we see just what we are made of. I am proud to say we live in a strong community.

Lastly, I would like to again thank all of our supporters who help fund some of our community programs. Citizen's Bank of Mukwonago for their support of our Milwaukee Brewers baseball card program; Continental Savings Bank for their support of our Green Bay Packer football card program; and American Legion Post #375 for their generous donation of \$500 for equipment and other juvenile safety programs. With your continued help and support, we will continue to make the Village of Mukwonago a safer place to live, work and play.

SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER PROGRAM


The Police Liaison program began in December 1999 and is the result of a partnership with the Village of Mukwonago Police Department and the Mukwonago Area School District. The Mukwonago High School provides the officer with an office, telephone, radio, computer and other equipment to assist the officer in the performance of his duties. The officer also responds to matters involving students at the Parkview Middle School.

This program is a proactive approach towards reducing and preventing problems associated with adolescents in the school. The program assists in providing the students with a safe learning environment and preventing incidents of school violence. Officer Brook is also involved in many programs in the Mukwonago High School and the community:

- √ Prime for Life is a program which provides research based drug and alcohol information to at risk students.
- √ Tobacco Abatement Resolution program works with tobacco at risk users in developing measures to stop using tobacco products.
- √ Coordinator of crime stoppers and the Quick 50 Program.

The Mukwonago Police Explorer Post #429 is a joint venture between the Village of Mukwonago Police Department and the Boy Scouts of America, Potawatomi Area Council, Waukesha, Wisconsin. The program is open to young men and women, ages 14 through 20. The major goal of the program is to provide the structure and resources needed for the youth of America to learn about career opportunities, to make ethical choices, and to achieve their full potential as individuals.

The advisor for Mukwonago Post #429 is Officer Andrew Mack. The explorers train nearly once a month. Training includes basic evidence collection, traffic stop procedures, defense and arrest tactics, K-9 demonstrations, and first responder training.

The Mukwonago Police Explorers participated in many community events in 2008. They assisted officers at some of the parades in the Village. They assisted officers in the child fingerprinting programs held. The explorers fingerprint children and provide the parents with the fingerprints if the need for them would ever arise.

Membership in the explorer post continues to grow. Former members of our Explorer Post are currently working as Police Officers in Milwaukee and New Berlin Police Departments.

OFFICER OF THE YEAR

Sergeant Kenneth Pileggi is the 2008 Officer of the Year. Sgt. Pileggi has been dedicated to our community and department for many years. He was the recipient of the 2008 Directors Award for Transportation Safety at the 2008 Wisconsin Governor's Conference on Highway Safety. This award recognized his outstanding commitment to promoting traffic safety in the Village of Mukwonago.

Sgt. Pileggi was also recently appointed to the Advisory Committee for Patrol Procedures with the State of Wisconsin Law Enforcement Standards Board. This committee oversees training standards for all of the Law Enforcement agencies in Wisconsin. Sgt. Pileggi is on the Wisconsin Traffic Safety Association Board, and a member of the Waukesha County Highway Safety Committee. Sgt. Pileggi teaches traffic safety at Waukesha County Technical College to police recruits and police officers. He also continues to work with the National Safekids Organization group which is



affiliated with Children's Hospital in Milwaukee. They provide training to assist parents and grandparents in the correct manner of installing child safety seats. I cannot possibly list everything Sgt. Pileggi has done to make our community a safer place to live.

CHILD SAFETY SEAT PROGRAM

A total of fifty-seven (57) child safety seats were inspected by certified child safety seat technicians of the Village of Mukwonago Police Department in 2008.

Approximately 71 % of the child safety seats inspected were not installed properly. The majority of the problems were incorrect usage of the latch along with safety belts. The next major problems were loose seats and harnesses. Two seats were beyond expiration recommendations and the owners were advised to replace the seats as soon as possible. Two seats arrived for the inspection uninstalled, three seats had tether problems and one seat was in need of a locking clip.

This agency conducted two (2) formal child safety seat events, one in April and the second in June. A majority of the fittings performed were walk-ins to the department when an officer/technician was on duty.

The majority of the checks were done for Village of Mukwonago residents (15), while Waukesha residents accounted for 8 seat checks, and Town of Mukwonago residents accounted for 7. Other residents serviced were from North Prairie, Eagle, Delafield, Elkhorn, Johnson Creek, Muskego, East Troy and Genesee Depot. Once again, this demonstrates our service stretches throughout Southeast Wisconsin.

A total of five (5) child safety seats were provided to participants. The reasons for providing these seats are listed below:

The seats are provided regardless of financial status of the recipient. Donations are accepted (as much as one can afford) at the time. If seats are out of date or otherwise serviceable, recommendations are made to the seat owner to go to a retailer and purchase a new seat for their child.

BIKE PATROL PROGRAM

The Village of Mukwonago Police Department bike patrol program was a success. As you may recall, the program was started in 2004 with donations from the Knights of Columbus and Wonago Biking.

Officer Daniel Streit utilized the bike patrol on fourteen (14) occasions this year, logging 109 miles on the bicycle. A break down of the uses is below. Officer Streit received positive feedback from the community regarding the bike patrol.

TOURS/TALKS/EVENTS

2008 was a busy year for the department. Cub Scout and Girl Scout troops requested tours of the department. The groups are shown all facets of the department, from clerical/dispatch to the evidence lab, to interview/interrogation rooms. We then hand out pencils, rulers, and many other items which contain anti-drug, crime prevention and general safety messages.

Officers of the department also gave talks to different clubs, groups and businesses in the Village. Talks were given to the various nursery and grade schools in the village, and to students at Door to Door Driving School. The talks to different businesses in the Village consist of workplace safety issues for employees.

On three (3) occasions in 2008, our department conducted child fingerprint programs. Fingerprinting was done at the Family Exposition at Clarendon Avenue School, customer appreciation days at Ace Hardware, and at Johnson Bank during the Community Fall Fest. We also fingerprinted a Cub Scout group to assist them in obtaining their merit badges.

The department also participates in the Parkview Middle School job shadowing program. Two students come to the department for a one hour period to observe members of the department in their work.

Working with the Small Farm Neighborhood Watch group, the department participated in the National Night Out program on August 5.

The following chart shows the various events the Mukwonago Police Department was involved with in 2008. The chart does not include talks or events previously discussed in this annual report. Those include talks the school liaison officer provided at the Mukwonago High School and Parkview Middle School, the child safety seat program and bike safety programs put on by the department bicycle patrol officer.







2008 MATTER OF REPORTS

In addition to the 470 Criminal Reports the department took in 2008, we also took 407 Matter Of Record reports. Some examples of matter of reports are arrests for serious traffic offenses (operating auto while intoxicated, etc...), suicides, sudden deaths, child custody disputes, lost property for insurance purposes, or neighbor disputes.

Another example of matter of reports is emergency detentions. Whenever a person is deemed to be a harm to themselves or others, an emergency detention must be completed by an officer. The person is transported to Waukesha Memorial Hospital for a medical clearance. An adult is then transported to the Waukesha County Mental Health Center. A juvenile is then transported to the Child Adolescent Treatment Center on the Milwaukee County Medical grounds. In 2008, our department took out twenty-nine (29) emergency detention matter of reports.

Eighteen (18) assist other department matter of reports were taken in 2008.




