message from the chief

Message from the Chief

I am pleased to present the 2014 annual report. This report contains information on the activities reported and acted upon by the officers and staff of your Village of Mukwonago Police Department.

This report provides statistics on crimes reported, arrests, and accidents which were reported to the department. It also covers various programs and partnerships the department is involved in.

If you are a new resident to the Village of Mukwonago, I want to welcome you and introduce you to your Police Department.



The department is located at 627 S. Rochester Street (STH 83), about ½ a mile north of I-43. The department consists of 14 officers, which includes command staff, 7 dispatcher/clerks, and currently 9 Police Reserve Officers who assist the department at special events.

The department provides police service to the Village of Mukwonago 24-hours-per-day, 7 days-per-week. Our dispatch center provides dispatch service to the Village of Mukwonago PD, the Town of Mukwonago PD and boat patrol, the Town of Eagle Boat Patrol and the Mukwonago Fire Department.

Mukwonago is a relatively safe community because of the commitment of every employee on the department to work for and with the community. I am proud of all the members of the department, from the command staff, to the officers, dispatcher/clerks, reserve officers and police explorers. Many of the employees volunteer for charity events outside of our work schedule. These events include Relay for Life, Special Olympics bowling tournament, Pro Health's Backpack/school supplies collection which supplies these items to families who can not afford to buy them, and the Salvation Army Bell Ringing competition with the Town of Mukwonago Police Department and the Mukwonago Fire Department.

Our work would not be possible without the strong support of the Village Board, Police Commission and all other employees of the Village of Mukwonago. Together we can and have made a difference. On behalf of all the members of the department, thank you for providing us with the resources to complete our mission.

The department is truly grateful for the help and support of the community. A Police Department is only as good as the citizens of the community allow it to be. If we, the police and citizens, do not work together, the police department will be swimming upstream in our efforts to make the community safe. We can not do the job of policing alone. We need you all to be involved in your community. This is your community and your police department. Together, with your help and support, we will continue to make our community a safe place.

New in 2014

Prescription Drop Box

The Police Department installed a medication disposal unit in the lobby in 2014. The disposal unit is secure and has a chute to prevent anyone from reaching in to remove medication. The anonymous program is for individuals, not businesses. Only medications are accepted. The following items cannot be disposed of in the unit: drugs such as marijuana, heroin and cocaine, sharps, inhalers, infectious or biohazard waste, hydrogen peroxide, aerosol cans, household waste creams, ointments and personal care products.

This drop box can be accessed in the police department lobby 24-hours-per-day.



Operation Reassurance

Village and Town of Mukwonago Police Departments are pleased to announce a new program called "Operation Reassurance." In communities such as ours, there are many people who live alone. The Village and Town of Mukwonago Police Departments care about their residents and are concerned about their well being. That is why we are offering a free program to Village of Mukwonago and Town of Mukwonago residents called "Operation Reassurance".

The purpose of Operation Reassurance is to assist senior citizens, or people living under special circumstances that live alone. Operation Reassurance is a program designed for enrolled participants to call their police department every day during the time frame given. For example, if the participant chooses to call us during the 9:00 AM to 10:30 AM window, then they will be expected to call every day of the week, 7 days a week, during this time. Participating in the Operation Reassurance Program doesn't mean a resident must stay home every day to call us. They can call us from anywhere. We know that things come up on short notice or some may enjoy traveling. When that happens, all they will need to do is contact your police department and let us know how long they will be gone.

If a call is not received by 10:30 AM, it will immediately trigger a chain of events that will not be satisfied until the missing participant's welfare has been verified.

1. First, a member of the respective Police Department will attempt a phone call.
2. If there is no answer, a police officer will be dispatched to the home to ensure the participant's well being. We will make every effort to reach one of the provided key holders.
3. In the event a key is not available to the police officer, forced entry into the home may be required. The Village and Town of Mukwonago Police Departments and their respective members will not be held liable for any damage incurred by the forced entry.

New in 2014

Suburban Critical Incident Team S.C.I.T.

The Suburban Critical Incident Team was formed in 2013. The team consists of select officers from nine area police departments. The current police departments on S.C.I.T. are the City of Brookfield, City of New Berlin, City of Muskego, City of Delafield, Village of Mukwonago, Village of Pewaukee, Village of Chenequa, Village of Hartland and the Village of Elm Grove. The team has 38 tactical officers, 15 negotiators and 4 personnel designated as part of its medical staff.

Officer DeMotto is Mukwonago's only officer assigned to the team. In 2014 he took part in 12 operations. The operations he was involved with were dignitary protection, search/arrest warrant service and barricaded subjects of violent criminals and suicide subjects. During this period the Mukwonago Police Department used members of the S.C.I.T. for two separate dignitary protection details. The first detail was for Lieutenant Governor Rebecca Kleefisch and the second was for U.S. Representative Paul Ryan.

School Resource Officer Program


The Police Resource Officer program began in December 1999 and is the result of a partnership with the Village of Mukwonago Police Department and the Mukwonago Area School District. This program is a proactive approach towards reducing and preventing problems associated with adolescents in the school. The program assists in providing the students with a safe learning environment and preventing incidents of school violence. The Officer is also involved in many programs in the High School and the community:

- Prime for Life** - a program which provides drug and alcohol information to at risk students.
- Tobacco Abatement Resolution** – Developing measures to stop using tobacco products.
- Quick 25/50 Program** - Coordinator of crime stoppers and the Quick 25/50 Program. Our current School Resource Officer is Jason Steinbrenner.

Definitions

- **Incidents** - any incident or behavioral referral that includes officer involvement
- **Arrests** - taking a person into physical custody
- **Talks** - presentations or talks to students, teachers, other faculty, or parent groups
- **Meetings** - any meeting with an administrator, teacher, or parents regarding a student or school related issue
- **Student Contacts** - any contact with a student regarding behavior or any other issue that includes officer involvement (theft, harassment, criminal damage, etc..)
- **Other** - Prime for Life Program, Crime Stoppers, Tornado & Lock Down drills, etc.





Mukwonago Police Reserve Program

The Mukwonago Police Reserve program has been in existence for over 30 years. It is a very unique program and one of the very few in Wisconsin that has both sworn certified officers as well as civilians.

The program at peak maintains a roster of 12 officers who perform a wide variety of duties at special events such as Maxwell Street Days, Summerfeste, St. James Festival, football and basketball games at Mukwonago High School, as well as all of the other special events throughout the village like the Memorial Day parade. The coordinator of the police reserve program is Officer Robert Melo.

The Reserve Officers receive all of the training that the full time officers do and ride along with the full time officers on a regular basis. Throughout the year they are an invaluable resource to the village.

The Village of Mukwonago Police Department can be very proud of the fact that because of the Reserve program a great number of its officers have gone on to become full time officers with countless agencies throughout state as well as our own department. Most recently Reserve Officer Jose Ortiz, because of his dedication and experience as a Reserve, will be sworn in on June 1st of 2015 as a full time officer with the Village of Mukwonago Police Department. We would like to personally congratulate Jose for this accomplishment and look forward to working with him for years to come.





Mukwonago Police Explorer Post #429

The Mukwonago Police Explorer Post #429 is a joint venture between the Village of Mukwonago Police Department and the Boy Scouts of America, Potawatomi Area Council, Waukesha, Wisconsin. The program is open to young men and women, ages 14 through 20. The major goal of the program is to provide the structure and resources needed for the youth of America to learn about career opportunities, to make ethical choices, and to achieve their full potential as individuals.

The advisor for Mukwonago Post # 429 is Officer Cory Kirkpatrick. We now have three (3) Police Explorers signed up for the program.

The explorers train periodically at the department. Training includes basic evidence collection, traffic stop procedures, defense and arrest tactics, and first responder training.

The Mukwonago Police Explorers assist officers at some of the parades in the Village, and also assist officers in the child fingerprinting programs held throughout the Village. The Explorers fingerprint children and provide the parents with the fingerprints if the need for them would ever arise.

Former members of our Explorer Post have gone on to careers in law enforcement. This includes David Zibolski, who retired as a captain of the Milwaukee Police Department and is currently working as the Deputy Administrator for the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Division of Law Enforcement Services. This also includes Officer Cory Kirkpatrick who is a former explorer and began working as an officer with the Village of Mukwonago Police Department in 2011.

In 2012, we began working with the Town of Mukwonago Police Department to make this a joint explorer post. Town Officer Mike Bennett and Village Officer Cory Kirkpatrick are advisors for the post.





Tours / Talks / Events

In 2014, Cub Scout and Girl Scout troops and a red hat society group requested tours of the department. The groups are shown all facets of the department, from dispatch to the evidence lab, to interview/interrogation room and patrol squads. The officer facilitator then hands out pencils, rulers, and many other items that contain anti-drug, crime prevention, stranger danger and general safety messages.

Officers of the department also gave talks to different clubs, groups and businesses in the Village. Talks were given to the various nursery and grade schools in the Village and to students at Door to Door Driving School. The talks to different businesses in the Village consist of workplace safety issues and crime prevention topics geared towards different groups such as bank employees, the elderly, and service clubs.

Our department conducted three (3) child fingerprinting programs. Fingerprint kits were handed out at the customer appreciation days at Ace Hardware, at the DNG Pro Health Child Safety program, and at the National Night Out event.

Officers participated in the prescription drug drop off programs held at the DNG Medical Center in the spring, and the prescription drug turn-in held in the fall conducted at Walgreen's. The spring drug turn-in netted two truckloads of turned in prescriptions. These programs prevent harmful unused prescriptions from being deposited into our water systems and landfills.

The department also participates in the Parkview Middle School job shadowing program. Two students come to the department for a one hour period to observe members of the department in the internal law enforcement work environment.

In 2014, the department joined with the Town of Mukwonago Police Department and started a new program, Coffee With A Cop. This is an event where there are no agendas or speeches, just officers from the community to answer questions, hear concerns and get to know people in the community. We would like to thank Culvers for providing the coffee and an area in their business for us to hold the 3 events.

Another new event the department participated in was the Waukesha County Victim/Witness Assistance Program "Trunks or Treat" event. Officers and squads from all county agencies were invited to send an officer and a squad. Kids, in their Halloween costume, were able to see the squads and get a treat from the officers.

The below chart shows various events the Police Department was involved with in 2014. The chart does not include talks or events discussed previously discussed in this annual report. Those include talks the school liaison officer provided at the Mukwonago High School and Parkview Middle School and the child safety seat program.

National Night Out

The Village of Mukwonago Police Department, working in conjunction with the Mukwonago Neighborhood Watch group, is very proud of the growing popularity of this annual event held at Field Park on the first Tuesday of every August each year.

The National Night Out is an event designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; Generate support for, and participation in, local anticrime efforts; Strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organized and fighting back!

The Mukwonago Police Department was proud to partner with the Town of Mukwonago Police Department and the Chamber of Commerce to host this event. Donors included Walmart, John Amato Ford, Aerogas, The Elegant Farmer, Culver's of Mukwonago and Roundy's Pick n Save who provided financial and material support to make the event a huge success.

Displays included Mukwonago Fire Department apparatus, fire prevention events, the Eagle Fire Department Survive Alive house, The Mukwonago Department of Public Works display, the Mukwonago Food Pantry, HAWS, the YMCA of Mukwonago and Pastor Mike, who brings the popular "choo-choo" train and bounce house for the children. We have made lasting partnerships with Scott the Brat Guy, the Kettle Corn Shop, and Gary Walters with his wonderful submarine display. Lisa, the face painter and Katie Gardipee, the caricature artist, were both huge draws and we could not thank them enough! We were also proud to have the United States Army in attendance with the ever popular dog tags. We are looking forward to both continuing and growing this awesome event with so many wonderful people that make up the fabric of our community – all in the name of keeping Mukwonago a safe place to live, work, visit and of course play!

We were also very proud to partner with the Village of Mukwonago Board of Trustees and President who all attended this event as well as the staff of Mukwonago Police Department who also volunteered for this event.





Child Safety Seat Program

A total of 35 child safety seats were inspected by the Village of Mukwonago Police Department's two child safety seat technicians in 2014.

Approximately 62% of the child safety seats inspected were not installed or not installed properly. Nine seats were recently purchased and the owners did not attempt to install them but wished for the technicians to install them instead. The majority of the seats problems were their harness or belts were too loose. Three child safety seats were in an improper location within the vehicle. One was taken out of service for being expired and another was taken out of service for excessive damage.

Due to the increased demands that the certifying body requires of our child safety seat technicians, certifications for the Village of Mukwonago's two safety seat technicians will expire in 2015.

Bike Patrol Program

The bicycle patrol program was started in 2004 with donations from the Knights of Columbus and Wonago Biking.

In 2014, Officer Kreiser utilized the bicycle patrol for the Memorial Day parade and the Father's Day parade, totaling 9 miles for the two parades. Officer Kreiser was also able to work three shifts, including Halloween, focusing on extra patrols utilizing the bicycle. The bicycle patrol put on a total of 25.7 miles during these three (3) shifts. There were five (5) calls responded to, assisted with, or self initiated by the bike patrol.



Neighborhood Watch Program

The Village of Mukwonago Neighborhood Watch Group meets approximately bi-monthly to discuss various criminal incidents occurring within different neighborhoods in the Village of Mukwonago. The Mukwonago Neighborhood Watch Group, specifically from Meadow Park Estates, has been a huge driver of the National Night Out event and the group has spent countless hours coordinating and assisting Mukwonago Police Department staff in conducting the event.

The partnership between the Police Department and Neighborhood Watch group is invaluable. The message is very simple that we want to convey - if you see something happening or out of the ordinary – call your Police Department!










2000 - 2014




